Welcome!

The AP Studio Art class is intended for highly motivated Junior and Senior students interested in studying art and design. AP course requirements are significantly more rigorous, and students should demonstrate commitment and accomplishment when enrolled. At least one year of Studio Art and a high level of technical art skills, creativity, and inquiry are prerequisites to this course. During the year, the students will work in and out of class to produce a portfolio to meet the standards set up by the College Board. Students will be expected to complete at least one piece of quality artwork every one or two weeks, complete practice exercises, keep a comprehensive sketchbook, document their ongoing inquiry and thinking processes, and participate in critique sessions. Each student must have a sketchbook with them and be able to develop these sketchbooks as ongoing journals throughout the year. This course emphasizes making art as an ongoing process that involves the student in informed and critical decision-making at all times, according to their inquiry.

Students create a portfolio of work to demonstrate inquiry through art and design and development of materials, processes, and ideas for a year. Portfolios include works of art and design, process documentation, and written information about the work presented. In May, students submit portfolios for evaluation based on specific criteria, which include skillful synthesis of materials, processes, and ideas and sustained investigation through practice, experimentation, and revision, guided by questions.

Instructional Goals

AP Art and Design courses should address the following learning outcomes: the ability to (1) conduct a sustained investigation through practice, experimentation, and revision, guided by questions; (2) skillfully synthesize materials, processes, and ideas; and (3) articulate, in writing, information about one's work.

Portfolio

Beginning in 2023-2024, the AP Art and Design portfolios will each consist of two sections:

1. Sustained Investigation (60% of exam score)

For all portfolios, students will submit images and writing to document their inquiry-guided investigation through practice, experimentation, and revision:

• 15 digital images that include works of art and design and process documentation.

Typed responses to prompts, providing information about the questions that guided their investigation and how they practiced, experimented, and revised, guided by their questions.

2. Selected Works (40% of exam score)

For all portfolios, students will submit works of art and design and writing to demonstrate skillful synthesis of materials, processes, and ideas:

 For AP 2-D Art and Design and AP Drawing: 5 physical works or high-quality reproductions of physical works with written responses on paper describing the materials, processes, and ideas used.

PREREQUISITE: Drawing & Painting, Art & Design, Advance Drawing. A4 Hardbound Sketchbook holds a minimum of 32 sheets (110 lb. (180 gsm)) is required.

Method of Instruction:

1-Summer Assignment Instructions:

You are to complete at least five of the following assignments over the summer for the AP 2-D Design class; it is also recommended that you work in a personal sketchbook / visual journal / altered book. <u>AP Art and Design Summer Assignment</u>

2- The AP portfolio has two options. These include

2-Dimensional Design and Drawing.

The 2-D Design portfolio explores 2-dimensional design principles using varied media. This portfolio could consist of graphic design, illustration, printmaking, photography, jewelry, collage, and other 2D media that solves 2-dimensional design problems.

The drawing portfolio involves the exploration of mark-making through any 2-dimensional media. This portfolio could include painting, drawing, printmaking, stitching, and possibly even college and photographs if they have been manipulated using mark-making techniques.

The Skills You'll Learn

In an AP Art and Design course, you'll practice and develop these skills:

Investigation:

Investigating the materials, processes, and ideas artists and designers use.

Experimentation:

Practicing, experimenting, and revising as you create your own work.

Communication:

Communicating your ideas about works of art and design

Your Goal for the Course

You'll create a portfolio of college-level work and submit it for evaluation (instead of taking a yearend paper-and-pencil AP Exam). A qualifying portfolio score can earn you college credit and/or advanced placement.

Your Portfolio Requirements

<u>AP Exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5. Many U.S. colleges grant credit and/or advanced</u> placement (that means they let you skip the equivalent course once you get to college) for scores of 3 and above.

All three AP Art and Design Portfolio Exams contain two sections: Sustained Investigation (60% of total score) and Selected Works (40% of total score).

Review the Sustained Investigation and Selected Works section overviews for guidance on building your portfolio.

- The Sustained Investigation section of the portfolio will consist of 12 high-quality artworks that clearly demonstrate that the student has developed a body of work by investigation of a theme or idea. The concentration section must show growth and discovery. In all three portfolios, digital photos will be submitted to document this discovery process.
- The Selected Works section of the portfolios will consist of 12 artworks that show a variety of mediums, techniques, approaches to drawing, and 2-D design. The students should demonstrate their knowledge of the elements and principles of art in these works. Units of study will be presented to satisfy this requirement for each portfolio. 12 digital photos will be submitted for this section.

POWER STANDARDS

Students will:

1. Apply and utilize the elements and principles of design in creating advanced artworks

2. Invent a comprehensive portfolio that illustrates the three Cs of art-making:

- Composition: Evidence of competent visual organization and design.
- Craftsmanship: Evidence of technical proficiency and visual acuity.
- Concept: Evidence of a clearly thought-out and communicated idea.

3. Analyze and critique advanced artworks in oral and written form using art-specific vocabulary.

4. Develop and apply an awareness of the proper care, use, and care of art-making materials while beginning to understand how to purchase materials for individualized needs.

5. Cultivate knowledge of aesthetics and the value of art and its historical significance for past and present society.

6. Begin to develop a unique style/voice utilizing digital imaging and mixed media printing.

7. Discover career opportunities that require art and design skills, while analyzing college choices that could develop individual artistry.

• **60** % Projects, Daily work and project completion (technique, application of the elements and principles of design, timely completion of individual assignments Final Portfolio Presentation)

Individual Assignments will be critiqued and graded at the completion of each unit of study.

Students will complete their own written assessment of the work, which will then be used as a guide for grading. Work that is not completed by the grading deadline/critique will be graded lower due to the incomplete resolution of the project criteria. Deadlines for work will not be extended except under extreme circumstances.

The Critique Process is viewed as an important aspect of the project development. Not participating in critique (written statements and oral discussion) will result in a lower project grade. Critiques are an integral part of all classes. All students are brought together for critiques at regular intervals, generally when they have major assignments due. Each student must show his or her work and briefly discuss his or her intent. The class is then expected to provide positive feedback and offer suggestions for improvement. All students participate. The vocabulary of art is introduced through the foundation

classes and is reinforced through the verbal and written critique and show reviews. We have class critiques on the day's work is due. These generally take the entire class to complete, sometimes more than one class period. I do very little talking during these sessions other than beginning the process with a recapping of the criteria for the project and a reminder to students to address the criteria as part of their discussion. I will only interject when I feel that something has not been addressed or have an idea about a possible solution or suggestion for the next piece. After I take the work up to grade it, I often provide the student with a brief written commentary. I use a simplified rubric based on the AP Scoring Guidelines for Studio Art for grading purposes. I think it is important for AP students to be familiar with the rubric that will be used to score the work in their portfolios. Additionally, there is an ongoing dialogue with students individually during class time. Also, the students dialogue with each other about their work.

- Notes from class lectures
- Planning sketches and research for individual assignments & weekly sketchbook assignments
- Artist Statements and other written reflections both in sketchbook and online.
- Set of drawing pencils, 2H, H, 2B, 4B, and 6B.
- Canvas and other painting supplies if needed

Student Responsibilities:

- 1. Be on time.

Assignments, Tests, Sketchbooks, Research & Final Exhibit

Elements- Art students will be expected to complete assignments on time. Grading will be determined by how well students meet the lesson-learning targets. All assignments are graded individually. Students are expected to come to class each week having completed all assigned sketches and journal responses outside class. Students will be required to submit a

research paper focusing on one artist's life. Element-Of Art students will participate in the organization of a "gallery quality" show located at.
